Key Story The Lord Calls and Equips Bezalel and Oholiab to Build the Tabernacle

Then the LORD said to Moses, "See, I have chosen Bezalel son of Uri, the son of Hur, of the tribe of Judah, and I have filled him with the Spirit of God, with wisdom, with understanding, with knowledge and with all kinds of skillsto make artistic designs for work in gold, silver and bronze, to cut and set stones, to work in wood, and to engage in all kinds of crafts. Moreover, I have appointed Oholiab son of Ahisamak, of the tribe of Dan, to help him. Also I have given ability to all the skilled workers to make everything I have commanded you . . .

Then Moses summoned Bezalel and Oholiab and every skilled person to whom the LORD had given ability and who was willing to come and do the work.

Exodus 36:2 (NIV)

## interpretation

In Exodus 31, God told Moses that he had chosen two craftsmen, Bezalel (Bez), and Oholiab (Oli), to lead all the other Israelite workers in building the tabernacle. Bez and Oli were already workcrew leaders from two different tribes (Judah and Dan). The other workers were also from every tribe and specialized in a wide range of different crafts.

Moses told the people God's plan for the temple, publicly appointed Bez and Oli as their leaders, and assured the people of God's selection by informing them of how God had equipped them. Then, Moses launched the project, instructing each worker to use all their God-given abilities to build the tabernacle.

What does this story teach us about our work? It's helpful to highlight a few details in this passage:

First, God chose and equipped Bez and Oli to do the kind of work they were already doing. He didn't move them from one vocation to another. His original plans and purpose for their lives did not change.

Second, the passage doesn't tell us exactly when or how God's Spirit filled these two leaders with the necessary abilities. While we may picture that it was an instantaneous infilling in a moment in time, it may have been a more gradual process. After all, from their childhood they had been trained to do their work and they had done their work so well that they became the leaders of their respective work crews. Likely, God trained them through their long, faithful work and the challenges they experienced, just as he uses these moments in all our lives to prepare us. If this is the case, we need to ask ourselves how God is preparing us through our daily experiences.

Finally, the people were instructed to work using all the skills, wisdom, and understanding God had given them. God cared about every task the people were doing. God was involved in every aspect of the building project. Everything we do at work matters to God.
